Celebrate BRUCE 750

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CRAC COMMUNITY ARTS

CRAG Community Arts SCIO have been awarded the contract to deliver the North Carrick Communities Arts Trail, with Bruce 750 themed sculptures across Bruce's Web, a project commissioned by NCCBC. The trail which will consist of nine sculptures with augmented reality content will traverse North Carrick travelling from Turnberry in the south, to Dunure in the North, and east to Straiton. Alongside the trail, visitors to the trail will download a phone app with augmented reality elements including a game play element; where you can experience Bruce weaving his way across Carrick once more.

With the Maybole sculpture already under construction, the remaining eight sculptures will be designed through a consultation process with each of the North Carrick communities.

This process has already started with CRAG artist David Powell - known for his Culzean and Rozelle steel and willow sculptures - visiting each of the six primary schools to discuss the Bruce 750 project while providing an insight to his own work practice as an artist.

The project is designed to celebrate the 750th Anniversary of the birth of King Robert the Bruce; as well as the communities in which the work will be sited. Young artists from each school are working in groups or individually to produce their own designs of a potential sculpture inspired by historical events and items associated with the Bruce, or their community. The artwork could well be modern or traditional in form. The new pieces will have an expected lifespan of 25 years; causing some excitement amongst the children! "I will be 35!"- piped up one the children at a school assembly; this will be a legacy of the Bruce 750 project that the children can pass down to the next generation and perhaps beyond!

With the CRAG Arts team are working with each of the schools to assist them in the initial design process; researching ideas and then producing 2D and 3D concepts from February to March. This is an exciting opportunity for our young folk to take part in a project that will enhance the experience both residents and visitors coming to our area; allowing them to follow in the footsteps of the Bruce and learn more about our community in the 21st century.

At the end of the ongoing design process period the community consultation will be held; this when locals can decide which design they would like to be made into a finished work. And that is the exciting bit - for at the moment no one knows what the work will be, or what our budding young

what our budding young artists will produce! How big? How small? What will they be made of? Just some of the questions that folk are

asking; but as our young artists will be busy designing over the next few weeks - the answer can only be - Who knows?

Likewise, the augmented reality content will be determined by the sculpture designs with AR providing locals and visitors alike with the opportunity to experience Bruce in a way not yet experienced! With the design team building in gameplay for the phone app; weaving history and technology together into a unique North Carrick experience!

The proposed dates for community consultations to be held in community halls and spaces is 23rd -24th of March so keep an eye open for updates on the project via our social media and that of NCCBC (@Improving North Carrick)

These dates are your chance to have a say on the sculpture in your community!



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

Progress update

Maybole Active Travel (MAT) Scheme – Phase 1 The Maybole Regeneration Project Team is looking for your views to transform Maybole High Street. Councillor Bob Pollock, Economic Development Portfolio Holder for South Ayrshire Council said "since the opening of the bypass, Maybole has a once-in-alifetime opportunity to make significant improvements. The aim is to rebalance the high street to make the best use of space for pedestrians, sustainable forms of transport as well as motorists."

Councillor Alec Clark, Tourism Culture and Rural Affairs Portfolio Holder said "The scheme would use high quality materials in keeping with historic buildings such as the town hall and castle. This is a chance to create an attractive and bustling town centre which better serves the local community, businesses and visitors"

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
RECOGNISING EXCELLENCE AT BFRIEND

The team at Bfriend are delighted to have achieved Excellence Standard in the Quality in Befriending Award (QiB) from Befriending Networks.

Bfriend, formally South Ayrshire Befriending Project, supports young people aged 8 – 18 who would benefit from social experiences with a fun and trusted adult befriender. Volunteers are recruited, trained and supported by the small, dedicated staff team to become befrienders. These befrienders are matched with a young person and help them access new opportunities within the local community, making a huge difference to their lives.

QiB is the only award in the UK which is specifically tailored for befriending services. The Award is achieved by providing evidence to successfully demonstrate that the project meets or exceeds the standards expected in; Service Policies and Procedures, Staff Management, Monitoring and Evaluation, Befriendee and Befriender journeys. "Bfriend has re-branded and changed offices, but the ethos and commitment has remained the same. Through the work of the staff and volunteers, the impact of the service is very impressive. "QiB Assessor.

The team were pleased to hear that the young people at the project echoed the assessor's comments

You have your MPs, your MSPs, your Councillors, (latterly) your MEPs, even the odd county member of The House of Lords - But a lot happens thanks to the armies of volunteers that work hard, and many times anonymously, to keep Maidens clean. 'Beachcomber' cannot walk the mile long crescent of the village shore from The Harbour to Barwhin Point on week-



ends without bumping into someone grabbing litter and debris, many times supervised, it seems, by a pair of swans silently supervising the work. It is an exceptionally clean beach.

And on 13th April (Date for your diary), there is a mass clean-up of 20 beaches on the Carrick coast. It is masterminded by the Ayrshire Coastal Path who keep the 100-mile trail maintained; and guess who by... well, volunteers of course!



Maybole and Carrick have lost one of the finest gentlemen in the sad passing of **David Kiltie M.B.E.** a person who had a vision, truly lived to do whatever he could to help anyone in any way he could and make his beloved Maybole a better place to live.

Eight page pullout on the life and works of **David Kiltie.**

David was born just after the end of WW2 to Sam and Betty Kiltie and had one sister Eileen. The familiar saying "it takes a whole village to raise a child" could not describe David's experience of growing up any better and was later embodied in his public service. From an early age David was a leader becoming school captain at Carrick Academy, an exemplary student and with encouragement from the head teacher, Leonard White to give service to his community. Little did he know that this would be a path which David would follow throughout his life. Sadly David's father broke his back in 1961 and things were very difficult at home. He was given the opportunity to go on a school trip to France but his family were not in a position to allow this to happen. When the neighbours heard about this situation everyone gave what they could afford to ensure that David would get to France. David never forgot this generosity. Perhaps it was this trip that encouraged David to link the towns of Maybole and Crosne together over 40 years ago. Margaret Davidson one of the town's longest serving Twinners said 'Maybole Town Twinning Association was set up in 1982 and due to David's driving force he took it to great success over the years. The first visit was made by David, Don Raby, Allan Murray and Jim Sym to Crosne on the outskirts of Paris. Crosne was also linked with Shotten in Germany, Beleoil in Belgium

and Arco in Italy and over the years strong friendships of these towns grew to include Maybole. Real friendships were formed and visits to these towns resulted in reciprocal visits to Maybole. Like many organisations numbers have declined over the years but Maybole still continues in smaller ways to keep Twinning alive. Like all good friendships when they meet after a separation they pick up where they left off. It says so much about the man that a representative from Crosne Twinning Association came to his funeral and many messages of condolences were received from all the twin towns. David has to be thanked for all his hard work as he opened up the world to many residents in Maybole. David once said "Town Twinning was one of my most proud achievements of what was a very busy fruitful life".



David Riltie

1945 ~ 2023

On leaving school David trained as a chartered accountant and worked with computers for publisher Collins in Glasgow before taking a job with Ayr County Council in 1970. David always had an interest in politics and worked in local government for a couple of years. When he was elected to Maybole Town Council in May 1969 it encouraged him to work with many groups in the town over the coming years.

David topped the poll in the local elections in May 1969 and was elected to the Town Council on his 24th birthday. He often recalled that time fondly by saying the elections were a lot livelier in those days and after hearing that he had been elected to the Council, he came out onto the balcony at the Town Hall to be greeted by the crowd, who started singing happy birthday to him'. David was the first SNP councillor and was joined later by two other SNP councillors. Within a couple of years he was appointed as Honorary Treasurer, the chairman of the Finance Committee and held that position until local government reorganisation in 1975.







David married his sweetheart Margaret in 1966 and had six daughters which prior to his marriage he told Margaret that this would be his ideal family.

They later had nine grandchildren and three great grandchildren.

David was never happier than when they were all together and was extremely proud of all their achievements.

David's community involvement at that time was Chair of the Attraction Committee which was run by the Council and involved organising dances, concerts and galas. He later created Maybole Community Association in 1975.

David was the first chairperson of Maybole Community Council in 1977 and served on it for 36 years and instigated many things which happened in Maybole during that time.

When David retired in 1996 he threw himself into many new projects and as one project completed he would have another idea ready to start something else.

Over the years David was involved with Maybole Community Development Group, Maybole Resource Centre, Maybole Charity Shop, Jean Falconer Literary Competition, Maybole Sick Nursing Association, Carrick Housing Association, Carrick Community Transport Group, Carrick 800, Maybole Historical Society, Maybole Youth Club, Ayrshire Leader, North Carrick Community Benefit Company, Chairman of the pastoral council of Our Lady and St Cuthbert Church, Maybole's longest serving Justice of the Peace on the Lord Lieutenant's committee which appoints new JP's and Maybole news correspondent for local papers for over 25 years.

David was also instrumental in setting up the Maybole.org website with Rich Pettit. Rich paid homage to David via this webpage when he learned of David's passing. Rich said 'David was my good friend and partner in creating this website for Maybole. In the early days of the Internet there were few Scottish towns with a website. I was interested in finding out more about my Scottish family history and David wanted the world to know about the vibrant community life and rich history of Maybole. Over many years David and I exchanged messages and images to document all that was Maybole, past and present. I live in the US and made several wonderful trips to my ancestral town with my family, where David, his family and friends greeted and treated us with the legendary Scottish hospitality'. Words cannot express my gratitude for the years of friendship and collaboration that I enjoyed with this notable of notables, David Kiltie, M.B.E, JP.

David's love of music started in the early 70's when a group of friends set up a mobile disco as they thought it would be a much cheaper alternative for people rather than hiring bands. In later years he became the resident D.J. in the Speakers Club in Maybole and became better known as D.J.D.K.. David loved being part of the entertainment every weekend and had lots of memories of happy times celebrating special events with many local people.

Gala Days at the Glebe field always found David with a microphone in his hand carrying out the Master of Ceremonies role in fancy dress of course whether it was a Town Crier, a clown or whatever was relevant to the theme, he was

the one person who always made Galas successful.

David Riltie

1945 ~ 2023



David was always a step ahead of wondering what to do next for the Town and when it was the 250th anniversary of the meeting of Robert Burns' parents at the market fair in Maybole this was exactly the type of event he wanted to organise. 'Burns and Aw That' was a year long event starting on Robert Burns' birthday and finishing with his parents' marriage in the December. Always keen to record such events David then set about producing a book about all the events that year. To commemorate this Anniversary he finished it off by having a bust of Robert Burns commissioned for display in Maybole Town Hall.



David's knowledge of local history was amazing and he could not let the opportunity pass him by to celebrate Maybole being a Burgh for 500 years and so Maybole 500 was celebrated with many events that year.

A historic exhibition in Maybole Town Hall with Mary Queen of Scots necklace on display, a lantern parade, a timeline of Maybole history was produced, local youngsters were filmed re-enacting some historical events and jousting to name but a few of what was a very busy year.



It goes without saying that one of David's greatest achievements was the setting up of Maytag, a training scheme for local people which provided them with many skills. Over a period of 20 years David attracted funding of over £5 million to the scheme which helped train many people and ultimately found them work. The most prestigious accolade anyone could receive would be a M.B.E. David received his Investiture from Major Richard Henderson Lord- Lieutenant of Ayrshire and Arran on behalf of her Majesty the Queen on the 19th December 2005. Typical of David always thinking of others, expressed such a wish so that members of his family, friends and colleagues might be present instead of the one or two who are permitted if the investiture takes place in one of the royal palaces.



No-one deserved this more than him for everything he has done for his town and community.

Gone but not forgotten

Here are just some of the MANY kind words that people had to say about David.



Remembering David Kiltie MBE

I first met David not long after I started my new job with South Ayrshire Council in March 2009. I attended a Maybole Community Council meeting in the historic setting of the Town Hall chambers. This was the beginning of what I felt turned out to be a productive and positive working relationship between myself, David, and the other key community leaders of Maybole.

My first impression of David was that he was clearly passionate about Maybole, and everything associated with the town and its communities. He was already the holder of an MBE by the time I got to know him, and this only added to his aura.

Campaigning for better services from the Council for Maybole, be that better quality roads and footpath surfaces, improved gritting provision in winter months, improved playparks for Maybole's young people, a new flagpole for the Greenside, and of course the small matter of a bypass to relieve Maybole's medieval High Street of the constant flow of HGVs travelling to and from the ferry port at Cairnryan, David led the way in seeking improvements.

I was impressed by the way in which David chaired the Maybole Community Council, delegating key functions to other Maybole Community Leaders like Peter Mason, Alan Murray Mark Fletcher and Senga, to name but a few, and through David's encouragement many significant achievements were delivered for the town.

David also had robust working relationships with the flow of South Ayrshire Councillors who crossed his path. But he treated all the same, and no one was left in any doubt what David was looking for, be they Ward Councillors or Council officers – action, and now! I respected David's in-depth knowledge of Maybole and its communities, its rich history, and his constant desire to make things better for today's residents and for tomorrow's.

David struck me as an intelligent man, a caring and compassionate man, and everyone was treated the same. I also formed an extraordinarily strong view that he did not suffer fools gladly and he also had the ability to 'show-off' his sharp tongue when he felt there was a need to do so!

David enjoyed many special moments with the Maybole community, and as well as the procession of the Olympic Torch through the town in 2012, David had the honour of carrying the Commonwealth Baton along Maybole's High Street in 2014 in recognition of his many years' service to the community.

The eventual opening of the Maybole Bypass was clearly a welcome and emotional time for David, as he and Peter Mason and others had campaigned and worked so hard for such a long time, when Senga cut the ribbon to officially open the road, it was like a lifetime's work had been realised and all the frustrating set-backs over the years had been worth it.

His commitment and dedication to Maybole has left a lasting legacy for David, but none more so than the continuing commitment of those following in his footsteps who want to continue to see Maybole and its people get the best services the Council and others can provide.

It was an honour and a privilege to know and work with David for a period of time, and his lasting memory for me will be the passion, dignity, and perseverance he showed in making things happen in Maybole, and improving the lives of so many people who live there. He has and will be missed.





Dynamic Dunure

A working group was set up in Dunure in 2018, with the support of South Ayrshire Council and North Carrick Community Benefit Company (NCCBC), to establish a vision and create an action plan to benefit local people and visitors. This group was formalised as the charity Dynamic Dunure in 2021. It brings together representatives from all parts of the village including the Community Council, Kennedy Hall & Park Association, Dunure Harbour Association, Fisherton School Parents' Council, the Coastal Rowing & Water Sports Club, the Youth Club and Fisherton Church.

Dynamic Dunure has the following purposes:

- The advancement of Citizenship and community development
- The advancement of Dunure's heritage and culture
- The provision of recreational facilities
- The advancement of environmental protection

Dynamic Dunure has already achieved success, including securing funding to build a boat store at the harbour for the rowing club and taking electricity to the castle, allowing the future plans of illuminating the Castle to be one step closer. It has also been working with South Ayrshire Council and NCCBC to develop a series of projects to benefit the residents and community and will be based around Kennedy Park, the Castle, the Harbour and enhancing access between them. This summer we should have a fully wheelchair accessible bridge linking the park with the path to the harbour.

We have been successful in our Expression of Interest to the Heritage Lottery Fund to build a Heritage Centre within Kennedy Park. We are now, with the generous support of South Ayrshire Council and NCCBC, progressing with our Stage One application.

When they asked us if they could be married in their special place we were delighted to say 'YES'! On a beautiful February afternoon, the studio was transformed into a wedding venue, and 40 guests witnessed the service, complete with pianist, piper, and a Rolls Royce. The hub sends congratulations to Marion and Lorna and we all wish them a long, healthy &

The Hub has already been very busy improving wellbeing in the surrounding areas. We have seen a huge surge in organisations seeking to support their teams and have been out in the community



providing wellbeing sessions to Z1 in Girvan, SAC's Thriving Communities, and Carrick Academy to name but a few. The wellbeing sessions combine sound therapy, holistic treatments, meditation, and mindful art; and offer teams the opportunity to recharge and be at their best in their busy roles.

We have also been busy with family sessions, working with Thriving Communities already this month to deliver wellbeing activities for parents and children. The little ones enjoyed a meditative magic carpet ride, magical crystals, sound healing, mindful art, and hand massage. Parents joined in with the session and the children were delighted to learn new relaxation techniques they could use with their parents and carers at home.



Another new initiative is our collaboration with Dementia Friendly North Carrick who are piloting a voucher scheme where carers of those with dementia can be gifted a holistic therapy session to help them to have some time to relax and focus on their own

The Hub was delighted to be successful in receiving year three funding from the Community Mental Health & Wellbeing Fund to continue holistic therapy sessions on referral for those with chronic, long-term conditions and disabilities, or struggling with stress, depression & anxiety. We are very grateful to VASA for their support. Our intake for the first half of 2024 has been filled. and we will release the remaining sessions in July. Referrals come from GPs, community links workers, and social work and the outcomes over the last two years have been very well received by the health professionals referring to us.

Our Hub family continues to grow,

and there are many new ideas for 2024 being thought up by our clients and volunteers. We'd love to see as many of these come to fruition as we can so will be working hard behind the scenes to look for funding to make even more great things happen for our community.

GSA Biosphere

The Galloway and Southern Ayrshire Biosphere has some exciting learning projects underway for 2024, building on the success of their Learning for Sustainability Toolkit which launched at Girvan Primary and has been rolled out to more than 40 schools across the UNESCO region. The brand new Blue Biosphere resource will be launched this summer, jam-packed with activities and ideas that teachers can use to introduce primary school pupils to our coastal and marine environments and the fascinating creatures that belong to the Biosphere's underwater world. The Blue Biosphere learning programme also contains information and activities based around climate change and the effects this is having on ocean life.

The Biosphere's staff Land Use and Biodiversity team are working hard on the South Ayrshire Small Scale Tree Planting Grant, a partnership project with South Ayrshire Council. Awards of up to £1,000 are available under this scheme, which aims to increase the number of broadleaf trees and improve publicly accessible green spaces to benefit people and nature alike. This is the pilot year for the grant and Biosphere officers are looking forward to helping develop a diversity of sites, from parkland and orchards to field boundaries and unused common ground.

North Carrick businesses and social enterprises are warmly invited to sign up for the Biosphere's Proud Supporter scheme. It's a commitment to sustainability which has created a network of more than 400 members across southwest Scotland. Proud Supporters are spotlighted on the Explore the Biosphere Map at www.gsabiosphere.org.uk and can access a private Facebook group to connect and collaborate with other businesses. They can also apply for the Biosphere Certification Mark, a trademarked quality scheme which comes with extensive business development and marketing support. Both initiatives are entirely free and applications are open all year round.
